m. Planning Matters

- i. Merton Heritage Strategy 2021-25: Development Plan
 - a. This development plan has been compiled using information supplied by Merton heritage providers including council departments, historic sites, visitor attractions and community groups. It is intended to be an evolving plan
 - b. Made submissions to this plan.
- ii. Revelstoke Road entrance improvements.
 - a. LBW 2021/0432 approved on 11th May 2021 subject to conditions.
 - b. LBM 21/P2657 granted 25th October 2021 subject to conditions.
 - c. Having difficult discussions with TfL leading to delays and costs. An invoice of £469.80 without receiving the estimate for wing wall fencing relocation.
 - d. This has led to invoking the complaints procedure.
 - e. **Progress has stalled.**
- iii. Dam Safety planning application LBM 21/P1930 granted 14th October 2021 subject to conditions.
 - a. The dam promenade is now open, and Wimbledon Park Brook has been daylighted. Landscaping still needed. **Suggested a free to use water garden be provided and mini golf be relocated.**
 - b. Revelstoke Road bund is to be landscaped.
 - c. The dam promenade between the watersports and area is the second spillway in a flood. Spillway design is based on a free passage of water with no obstructions which could disturb the flow or catch debris. Andy Hughes (Dam Inspector) says; 'Therefore I have said no benches are allowed in this area, but I have allowed the trees to remain. Benches can be put in any area outside the spillway'.

- iv. LBM local plan
 - a. Examination Of Merton's Local Plan. Notice Of Independent Examination Hearing. Town And Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012. Statutory Instrument No.767 Regulation 24.
 - b. The hearings will be divided into two stages:
 - c. Stage 1 of the hearing sessions now completed. On Matter 14 the 1993 covenant, Wi3 area, vistas, blots on landscape around lakeside, biodiversity and assets, sport, wellbeing and community were covered.
 1. Statement of Common Ground between Merton Council and Historic England - Addendum Matter 14. 10/06/2022.
 2. An extract: *'Secure the production of a landscape management and maintenance plan as part of any development proposals that may come forward, to provide a comprehensive plan for the conservation, enhancement and ongoing management of the entire registered park and garden that takes full account of the site's historic development and significance, acting as a common agreed baseline for all parties to work from'*.
 3. *Comment made that the Community should be involved.*
 - d. Stage 2 of the hearing sessions will commence at 10:00am from: Tuesday 4th October to Friday 7th October 2022 and on Tuesday 18th October to Friday 21st October 2022.
- v. AELTC Wimbledon Park Project.
 - a. LBM 21/P2900 a further 80 documents submitted.
 - b. LBW 2021/3609 further 80 documents submitted.
 - c. Car park 10 in the public park numbers have been reduced from 660 to 350 in the application and to cease by 2026. Feedback from Community indicates that this should cease in 2023.
 - d. **5th submission sent in.**
 - e. **Comments requested on camping in the public park.**
 1. **Queue and/or camping – AELTC appear to have marked out the whole of the Great Field for this and installed several food stalls with generators, refrigeration units, tents, cars on the grass, etc, all together leaving no room in the Great Field for local residents to play, relax, etc.**
 2. **Better liaison is needed and whether an operation needs a licence.**

- y. **Public Park Management issues**
 - i. Restitution of the park after events
 - a. Pines & Needles returned to area caused damage followed by Pub in the Park and the AELTC. **Re-grassing delayed until September (see events).**
 - ii. Green Flag Award
 - a. Intention to discuss with Andrew Kauffman soon.
 - iii. Community Payback Team (CPT)
 - a. The CPT have received more equipment so a wider range of tasks can be accepted.
 - iv. Toilets play area.
 - a. Playground toilets are renovated but blockage risk remains as drainage not improved.
 - b. Considering demolishing toilets and relocating to enlarged café in line with LBM Masterplan.
 - v. Toilets watersports.
 - a. Blockages occurring due to narrow drains.
 - vi. Recycling in WP.
 - a. Mario Silva (idverde): 'All the bins in the borough are used as general waste. Dog waste is dumped in all the bins around all the parks, and we take it to the tip where it is incinerated. We have no means to recycle even the twin bins (recycle and landfill) are used to dispose of dog waste'.
 - vii. Play areas including water play.
 - a. No action on this yet.
 - viii. Portable lighting
 - a. Emma Carnell (idverde) asks whether there are any issues with the following.
 - b. The request is from an unmarked pitch customer who wishes to use his own rechargeable, portable floodlights.
 - c. The customer has advised that they cover about 25sq feet, there are 4 of them and they are used for small sided games.
 - d. Dave Dawson advises: 'we have quite enough lights as it is. Apart from the stadium and stadium lane (when in use) and tennis courts, there are also fancy streetlamps along the lakeside promenade and to and from the Revelstoke Road Car Park. Many of the streetlights are left on all night regardless of whether the park is in use. We believe that this has already limited the usage of the lake by Daubenton's bat. The Great Field and Horse Close Wood are free of lighting and it would be good, not only to keep them this way, but also to curtail lights on the lakeside to occasions when the stadium or watersports centre are actually in use'.
- z. **Wimbledon Park Volunteers**
 - i. Tree planting:
 - a. March 4th and 5th 2022. 160 whips planted and 4 flower beds for hornbeam whips seeded with cornfield annuals. Corn Cockle, Corn Chamomile, Cornflower, corn marigold and field poppy.
 - b. Stone Pine offered by Ian Campbell which we accepted. Site to be decided but in the southern section of the park which can be described as a mini arboretum. Probably in November.



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- c. Dave Dawson drafting tree planting plan to include November as well as February 2023.
- ii. Tasks to be undertaken
 - a. From Simon Woods (idverde)
 - (i) It would make much more sense if you informed us of areas that you feel the friends can take on comfortably and regularly and we would then concentrate our time elsewhere in park.
 - (ii) If you would like to take on the area within bowls green to start that would be ok, rose beds need regular weeding and occasional topping up of mulch.
 - (iii) We have not carried out any glyphosate treatment so the vegetation around park will soon be visible around all the areas mentioned below on email trail so these areas will need hoeing/hand weeding throughout the growing season.
 - (iv) We are happy for friends to plant pavilion bed as mentioned and take ownership of this area with a sign which may encourage others to join your group.

- 1) Botton's Funfair Easter, 2nd-24th April 11am-6pm and expected back in August
 - a. The newly seeded grass did not suffer too badly, even after the very heavy rain on 6 April. Idverde watered the grass and it appeared to recover well.
 - b. We need to consider a different surface for this event space and maybe combine it with a hard wearing sport's surface (suggestions include Petanque, 5 a side football, Padel tennis)? Plan to discuss this further with Merton following completion of the dam safety works and potential relocation of beach volleyball courts.

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- a. Have asked Merton to come to Wimbledon Park next year. Francis's view is "they are a good and professional outfit, we have dealt with them lots as they normally go to Figges Marsh. I'll ask Emma to get suggested dates from them"
- 3) Pub in the Park 27-29 May, with setup 25,26 May and dismantling 30, 31 May
 - a. Appeared to be well run and managed, including proper vehicle trackways to protect the grass, good communication with local residents and stakeholders, leaving space for the park run (which unfortunately decided no to go ahead – not sure why).
 - b. loud music from stage generated some complaints from local residents.
 - c. Setup commenced earlier than expected on Friday 20 May with the vehicle trackway
 - d. Heavy rain just before dismantling the site led to damage to the grass on the same patch as Pines & Needles (which had never recovered anyway and will be trashed again by AELTC car parking in June).
- 4) AELTC 27 June - 12 July (plus setup and dismantling)
 - a. Car Parking 325 cars (we would much rather this did not take place at all)
 - b. Queue and/or camping – AELTC appear to have marked out the whole of the Great Field for this and also installed several food stalls with generators, refrigeration units, tents (!) cars on the grass, etc, all together leaving no room in the Great Field for local residents to play, relax, etc.
 - c. Very little information from Merton - did not reply to multiple requests for information on car parking and camping.
 - d. **From Ulrika Holberg (AELTC) subsequently received:**
 - a. **Restoration of the grassy field area:** in previous years the AELTC has repaired any damage to the grass straight after The Championships. This year we are liaising closely with IDVerde and it has been agreed that IDVerde will be carrying out the repairs. The repairs will take place in September and will repair the damage from Pines & Needles last year, Pub in the Park and of course any damage done by the Queue operation and Car Park 10 and we are contributing to those repair costs. It was felt that one coordinated effort was the best way forward so that visitors to the park can enjoy as much space as possible over the summer and not have areas cornered off.
 - b. **Queue operations:** A) Food trucks: the number of food trucks was the same as in previous years when the Queue has been in operation but I would not be surprised that given the Queue level at times, not all food provision either remained in place or was operational for the full two weeks. B) bin bags in the Queue: fully take onboard your point about plastic bags on poles and the rubbish being a grass/dog level. This was not the ideal solution by any means but a shortage of standing (and therefore more secure) bins meant that this was the most viable solution in order to make sure that we collected as much rubbish as possible. We have fed back your comments and there will be sturdy bins in place next year. C) Queue lane poles: again, a very good point raised. As we didn't know what the demand for the Queue was going to be, the infrastructure catered for the numbers we saw in 2019. Again, we have fed back your comments on having something more flexible in place so that we can take out and add lanes as needed for next year.
 - c. **Cleaning of pavements in Southfields:** not something raised in the meeting last week but thought you and others would be interested to know that following the wear and tear caused by the footfall from The Championships on the newly laid pavements along the shop fronts on Wimbledon Park Road in Southfields and a helpful suggestion from a local resident on Wimbledon Park Road, we have offered for our cleaning contractor to carry out a clean-up of Southfields station forecourt and pavements in front of the shops on both sides of Wimbledon Park Road. Liaising with Wandsworth Council on this they have indicated that they will be carrying out cleaning of the paving in Southfields this week and we will work with the Council to see if further cleaning is required at a later stage.

Merton's view: "We haven't seen any event management plan as yet, so can't comment on transport movement, ingress, egress, etc I'd rather we used WP Rd for in/out and kept Revelstoke free. I believe Andrew has asked for the lighting to be fixed on the walk down from WP Rd."

- a. The loss of available green space (non-fee paying), damage to nature, noise from music etc are all becoming increasing concerns as the number of large commercial events grows. Pub in the Park, Gin Festival, Zippo's Circus are very significant new additions.
 - b. Asked Merton to arrange a zoom meeting or onsite meeting week commencing 18 or 25 April – no response.
